Taft Matney is a public relations and governmental affairs consultant who moved to Mauldin in 1973.

He is a 1991 graduate of Mauldin High School and earned a degree in Interdisciplinary Studies with concentrations in government and business from USC Upstate, where he was a member of the school's debate team.
