The Greater Mauldin Chamber of Commerce and the City of Mauldin hosted another year of the largest push-button operated, interactive layout on the East Coast from the Atlantic

The train show also featured the new Piedmont 'N Southern Modular N Scale layout by the Piedmont 'N



"Discovering ways in which differences can strengthen our organizations is of utmost importance as we seek to grow and support a thriving economy and rich culture," said Dr. Donald Gordon, executive director of the Riley Institute.

DLI class members are identified through a rigorous process including nominations from existing Riley Fellows, application, and interview. Individuals are selected to join the class based on their capacity to impact their organizations and communities.

Administrator Madden will work with other class members in one of five Capstone project groups formed to respond to real issues in the community.

DLI graduates become Riley Fellows, members of a powerful, cross-sector, statewide leadership network that includes CEOs of corporations, mayors, city and county council members, legislators, school superintendents, pastors and rabbis, non-profit heads, chamber of commerce directors, and community leaders. In addition to the Upstate, DLI classes are selected annually in the Midlands and Lowcountry.







Mauldin Cultural Center

In mid-August, 160 students auditioned for the Mauldin Youth Theatre's upcoming production of Disney's *Frozen, JR*. Actors were picked to fill 38 roles and began rehearsals before the end of the month. Tickets for the production will go on sale in September.

The Mauldin Farmers Market, sponsored by Bon Secours St. Francis Health System, came to an end in August. The last two Markets were cancelled due to weather, but those looking to shop local won't have to wait long - the Mauldin Holiday Market will be back in December, offering the perfect selection of gifts to buy for loved ones.


The Cultural Center's full 2019-2020 Season was announced in late August to much anticipation. Fall of 2019 begins with the annual *SOOIE.*, Mauldin BBQ Cook-off on September 20-21. October will bring a fundraiser dinner for the Cultural Center theatre program on October 4, followed by a Jack'o'lantern Jubilee at Carolina Fashions on October 26. Next will be the Mauldin Youth Theatre's production of Disney's *Frozen, JR.*, running for three weekends from November 8-24. The Mauldin Public Art Trail will have its fifth sculpture installed, with the unveiling date in late fall (date to be announced). For the holidays, folks can enjoy Mauldin's Christmas Kick-off December 6-7, including a Holiday Market, Pictures with Santa, the annual Tree Lighting, a Christmas Parade down Butler Road, and more. From December 13-21, the Cultural Center will present a musical revue of holiday music, from class Christmas hits to carols and more!

From March 20-29, 2020, the Mauldin Youth Theatre will perform *Annie, JR.*; auditions will be held in January. In April, the spring weather will be perfect for the first ever PB&J Festival (Pizza, Blues & Jazz Festival), which will feature an arts market, live music, and delicious pizza. May will also bring a brand new event - the Mauldin Theatre Company's inaugural production, *Seussical*, featuring both youth and adult actors. The Mauldin Farmers Market and Beachin' Fridays will also return in 2020, and the dancing will continue in August with *Let the Good Times Roll*, a musical revue of retro tunes from the 50's to the 70's. Youth Athletics

The kickoff to the fall sports season was the Football Jamboree on August 24 at Sunset Park. Mauldin teams welcomed Simpsonville, Fountain Inn, and Greer for the season opening event. The regular season for tackle football began on September 3; all the teams and cheerleaders were excited to get started. The regular season will run until end of October, followed by All-Star games.

Fall baseball and fall softball both began play in early September. A new 6U division has been added this season, with enough players signing up to form two teams. The 8U, 10U, and 12U fall baseball teams will play games with teams from Greer; the softball and 14U baseball teams will play against Simpsonville and Fountain Inn. In all, eighteen teams from Mauldin are playing baseball or softball this fall, and the season will last until the end of October.

Flag football also began their games in early September, playing against teams from Simpsonville and Fountain Inn with teams in each division (6U, 8U, and 10U). This season will also last until the end of October.


Fire Prevention Education/Training

During the month of August, the Mauldin Fire Department participated in thirteen events promoting fire safety and education. These events included the Mauldin Farmers Market, two Touch-a-Truck events, and the Miller Oaks Apartments community day event. Firefighters also completed six car set installations for citizens.

In August, personnel performed pre-fire plans on commercial structures and updated emergency contact information for businesses and organizations throughout the City. Shift personnel also completed first responder classes, and driver operators trained for their upcoming engineer testing to take place in October. In all, MFD personnel completed 1,268 hours of training for the month of August.
