Disney's *Frozen, JR.*, sponsored by Prisma Health and the Metropolitan Arts Council, was a huge success! The production, which included 12 shows, brought in nearly 2,500 visitors over the course of three weekends. The cast and crew consistently gave audiences an unforgettable show, and just in time for Disney's Frozen II to hit theaters!

The Cultural Team sent out a survey for feedback regarding guest experience and have received so many positive responses. Just a few notes from the results so far:

- 54% of guests had not been to a theatre production at the Cultural Center before.
- 44% had never been to a class or other event at the Cultural Center before.
- 67% do not live or work in Mauldin, nor do they have family that do so in Mauldin.
- 21% live or have immediate family who live in Mauldin.
- 66% regularly attend performing arts productions in the Upstate.
- 100% would recommend seeing a production at the Cultural Center to their friends.

The City of Mauldin and the Mauldin Cultural Center hosted a public unveiling of the fifth installation along the Mauldin Public Art Trail in mid-November. Artist Aldo Muzzarelli's sculpture exemplifies the theme, "Youth: Passion for Change" celebrating youth as the future and the driving force behind positive change across the globe.

Mayor Dennis Raines welcomed viewers and gave a brief history of the Public Art Trail. Cultural Center director Keira Heider and Councilman Scott Crosby (who is also on the Mauldin Cultural Council) also spoke, followed by a ribbon cutting from the Chamber

of Commerce. Muzzarelli then shared his views on the work, "For me, the butterfly represents freedom, continuous change, and happiness."


The sculpture features the figure of a child resting within a rectangular frame meant to represent the barriers that everyone must overcome in life. A butterfly cocoon can be found in the young boy's cupped hands, while colorful butterflies rest on the outer edge of the frame.

"Youth, like a cocoon, carries with it all that potential energy necessary for change: the desire to fight, to transform, to face, to fly, to move forward," said Muzzarelli. "In addition, I hope that the character of the artwork achieves many other connotations. For example, the importance of living in a country like this, where young people have the possibility to choose their future, to choose peace."













Mauldin Public Works will collect loose leaves for residents of the City of Mauldin who perform their own yard work. Please note the following as it relates to leaf collection:

- Place loose leaves at the curb or edge of street.
- Keep catch basins, inlets, and gutters free of leaves and debris.
- Loose leaves should not be placed in trash containers.
- Place leaves and tree limbs in separate piles.
- City crews do not provide service to commercial properties such as businesses, schools, churches or apartment complexes.
- Landscape contractors are responsible for proper disposal of all leaf piles they create.

Youth Athletics

Mauldin Recreation hosted numerous nights of Western District football tournament games at the Mauldin High School stadium. The Mauldin Recreation 8U, 10U, and 12U All-Star Football teams each competed in the SCAP Western District Championship. The 12U team defeated Fountain Inn and advanced the SCAP Upper State Football Championship, where they defeated the team from Rock Hill. Now the 12U team will advance to the SCAP State Championship game, which will be



played on December 14 in Georgetown at Waccamaw High School.

Youth basketball teams are practicing and preparing for the upcoming season. The Basketball Jamboree will be December 13-14 at the Mauldin Sports Center. Regular season games begin January 6, 2020. More participants registered this year compared to last year, with a new 6U division added for this season. This division will introduce younger children to basketball with teammates their own age. The Sports Center is offering new classes and schedules during December:


- Piloxing a fusion of pilates, boxing, and dance for all fitness levels: Fridays at 8:35 a.m.

Residential Permits Issued



During November, the Mauldin Fire Department participated in twelve events promoting fire safety including two Halloween parades, Greenville County Elections, Park View Apartments' Meet and Greet, a City Park cook out, the Community Chapel Fall Festival, a Puppet Show at Mauldin First Academy, the Verizon Wireless 5k run, Fall Family

Three awards were presented during the celebration: Bailey Transiskus was presented with the Firefighter of the Year award; John Centrone was presented with Rookie of the Year award; and Jacob Looney was presented with the Excellence in Training award.







MAULDIN HOLDS CEREMONY IN OBSERVANCE OF VETERANS DAY

A public ceremony in observance of Veterans Day was held on November 11 to recognize those who have served our country. The ceremony included a Presentation of Colors by the Naval Honor Guard; a prayer led by Marine veteran Pastor Jeremy Bell; the national anthem performed by the Crossroad Trio; remarks by Mayor Dennis Raines; recognitions by City representatives and local veterans; and more musical selections honoring U.S. veterans.

"Since the birth of our nation, there have always been brave men and women standing in the gap to ensure our freedom," said Mayor Raines during the ceremony. "These brave men and women have given their all to defend our country and our honor. They do this with valor, dedication, and self-sacrifice."

The Veterans Day Ceremony began in 2008, initially organized by Janice Holcombe, Councilman Larry Goodson, and other city leadership at the time. The Holcombe family donated a bench with an engraved plaque along the Veterans Memorial Walkway in honor of Janice's father and father-in-law, both of whom were veterans.

"I wanted to ensure our children and our grandchildren and our city was realizing this legacy that has been passed along by the service to our Country of my father and father-in-law and all our veterans," said Janice when asked about the ceremony.
